The Pastor's Notebook

Trust is lived, not learned -- Words to live by into each day of your future!

There is an old joke about a man who fell off a mountain side, but fortunately grabbed hold onto a plant growing out of the mountain. Hanging desperately, he shouted a prayer: "God please help me" only to be shocked to hear a voice say, "Let go, my son and trust me, and I will catch you!" His response was to yell even louder: "Is anyone else up there?" We all know how hard it is to trust in difficult situations!

Trusting is essential for growth and healing. Some medical researchers question whether it is medicines which cure us or the trust we put in them which marshals our immune system to heal us. It is probably both. But trust is essential for growth or healing of any kind. Trust is, however, a quality which cannot be taught or demanded of anyone. It is a choice and commitment which a person makes that is very personal and yet, communal. It is personal because it happens deep within our spirit in relationship to God. It is easy to "talk trust" with God-talk, but that doesn't mean a person really does trust God within. But trust is also communal because though we cannot teach another to trust, we can, at times, "infect" another with trust by being trusting ourselves.

The best possible thing a Christian can do in their life is to practice trusting God by asking for God's help in our relationships and needs, and then taking the risk of believing God will supply our needs and pushing forward with our decisions and actions. It is just as the Proverb writer of 3:5,6 wrote:

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths!"

As all of you at St. John's Reformed Church begin a new pastoral relationship and future for your church,

I encourage you to keep that verse in your minds and hearts and watch what the Lord can do with your Church as you let God direct your paths!

May the Lord bless and keep St. John's Reformed Church, Pastor Alisha and all you in God's love as you explore your exciting future together!

CALL TO A NEW MINISTER

On Sunday, September 5, 2021 candidate The Rev. Alisha Riepma led worship at St. John's at the invitation of the Consistory. During the Special Congregational Meeting after the service, the congregation cast a very positive vote of confidence for the candidate.

The Consistory held a special meeting that evening via Zoom. They voted to affirm the will of the congregation to extend a call to The Rev. Alisha Riepma.

Details of her call, a formal, legal document, are being worked out between the candidate, the Finance Committee and the Consistory. When all parties agree to the call's terms, the Consistory will vote to affirm and accept this call document.

The call will then go to the Human Support Committee of the Classis of Mid-Hudson, on to the Executive Committee, and finally to the floor of Classis at its October 26, 2021 meeting for the final vote.

After the Executive Committee has given its approval of the terms of the call, we can move forward. Pastor Alisha can move into the parsonage and we can set a date for her to begin work as our Minister of Word and Sacrament. We need not wait until after the October 26 Classis meeting to begin our working relationship.

We are not sure when all this will take place, but we will keep you informed as to when all this will happen. We will also celebrate The Rev. Dr. Donald Heringa's last Sunday and let you know when that will be. The transition will likely take place in October.

Thank you to the Consistory, the Search Committee, and a special thank you to the Chair, Glenn Countryman who put in countless hours over the past year seeking God's will for all of us.

Mrs. Wambach is willing to teach the younger class and complete her worship service at home, but we hope to get other teachers involved to give them all a chance to teach and a chance to worship.



RE-OPENING COMMITTEE UPDATES

Some of the outside groups that have used St. John's space in the past have patiently waited until they were given permission to return to our building.

Here are the new guidelines for outside groups and much of this is pertinent for Church groups as well.

Everyone must sign in or be accounted for on the contact tracing sheet provided by the Church Office. The contact person is responsible for returning this sheet to the Church Office.

Everyone needs to make use of the hand sanitizer upon entering the building and as needed.

Everyone must wear masks indoors, covering mouth and nose.

Social distancing of 3-6 feet is encouraged, especially when people are seated and possibly eating. Extra tables and chairs are available to help maintain distance. There is still a limit on the number of people we can reasonably accommodate.

Tables and chairs need to be wiped down after use. Please use the cleaning supplies provided.

Windows need to be opened as wide as weather permits and closed at the end of a meeting. Dress appropriately as the temperatures decrease. (This is especially true for worship. Bring or wear sweaters and jackets.)

Bringing in food is permitted. Avoid sharing serving utensils to minimize contact. Please wash any dishes or utensils used.

Please dispose of all food/garbage (bring it in-carry it out) in the dumpster at the north end of St. John's parking lot after your meeting or event. As we are soon to have a new sexton, this will not be true for St. John's groups and committees. Use caution handling other people's garbage.

The Church kitchen stove and ovens are still not available for use due to Dutchess County Health Dept. regulations. The Property Committee will get to this as time and funds allow.

The coffee maker needs to be cleaned as it has been sitting for 18 months unused. It is hoped that it can be cleaned before October.

Thank you to everyone who donated to the August Mission of the Month: school supplies. A \$119 was spent on school supplies for the Food Pantry clients.

Did you know...

Budget preparation began when the various departments and committees within our church provided the Finance Committee with their best estimate of the expenses that will be needed during the Budget year 2022. In October, Consistory and Finance will come to an agreement about the Expense side of the budget.

Obviously, there is another side of the budget - the Income side. We are asking everyone in the congregation to start thinking about the income side, and especially pledging. While we can never accurately predict the income, pledging is the best tool we have to help estimate our income.

Here are some things for you to consider when you think about making your own pledge to St. Johns:

- 1. Your pledges will be made anonymously.
- 2. Giving should come joyfully out of gratitude for the blessings we

have received from God. Even in this challenging year, the gifts

are many.

3. The Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) represents the rate of

inflation, and is used to adjust Social Security benefits in order to counter inflation. That percentage rate is usually announced in October. It is expected to be unusually high this year, likely more than 5%. If you are able to increase your pledge by the COLA percentage, you will maintain the purchasing power of your pledge.

4. In 2022, we will have an installed minister, which will result in higher monthly expenses than we have had in 2021. Most of us indicated in the survey that we want and need a full-time Pastor. Now is the time to support that decision.

Here again are the important dates for your participation in the budget process:

November 1

Proposed budget, a letter, and a Pledge Card will be mailed or emailed to members. (Call Shari if you prefer to have a hard copy mailed.)

November 14

Budget Question and Answer meeting, immediately following the worship service. This is the time to ask your questions about the proposed budget and the pledging process.

November 21

Congregational Meeting, following the worship service. At this time, we will:

Vote on the 2022 budget ● Hold Consistory Elections ● Present our Pledge Cards

If you cannot attend the meeting, you may call the church office to register your vote over the phone. You may mail in your Pledge Cards at any time.
